Wine Operations Project

Summary of Validation Feedback, Responses and Actions



24 April 2018

Summary

This project included the review and redesign of the two wine industry operations qualifications, eight skill sets and their related units of competency. The draft components for this project were made available for broader stakeholder feedback from 9 – 26 February 2018.

Validation

Following is a summary of the issues and feedback received during industry/public consultation for the two qualifications and units of competency and the responses and actions taken that are related to these issues and feedback. This has involved consideration of the information provided, the views of industry stakeholders where known, and the views provided by the people who were part of the subject matter expert (SME) processes. Resolutions are constructed to take into account the needs and views of stakeholders to the extent possible, and to comply with the *Standards for Training Packages* 2012. The resolutions may represent a compromise on one or more stakeholder views with the aim of a workable outcome for industry, State and Territory Training Authorities (STAs) and Training Providers. No feedback was received about the skill sets.

Overall the proposed structure is practical and relevant to industry, the lowering of the total units to achieve the qualification was essential and is now achievable for wineries of all sizes. The core units look fine although it would be great to have more time to be able to have a detailed look at the unit FBPWIN2001. However, we do recommend a few minor changes which in our opinion would not only improve the certificate 2 qualification, but also assist in alleviating the issues within the certificate 3.

Move FBPBPG2004 – Operate the bottle sealing process from C2 into C3 (at the very least the unit should be available in C2 & C3)

The rationale behind this change is that the sealing process is completed in conjunction with 'Operate the Bottle Filling Process', therefore when receiving training on the filler you would also receive training in bottle sealing. The one operator is also responsible for both tasks so it makes sense to have it in C3

Move FBPCEL2014 – Operate the Rotary Vacuum Filtration Process from C2 into C3 (at the very least the unit should be available in C2 & C3)

This unit is of a greater difficulty and should be a C3 unit, by moving it into C3 it would not cause any structure issues for C2 but would help alleviate the issues in C3

Move FBPCEL2xx1 – Operate the Crossflow Filtration Process from C2 into C3 (at the very least the unit should be available in C2 & C3)

Once again of a greater difficulty and should be a C3 unit, by moving it into C3 it would not cause any structure issues for C2 but would help alleviate the issues in C3

Confined Space units, why have 2 different units i.e. FBPOPR2065 – Work in confined spaces in the food and beverage industries in Group F and MSMPER205 – Enter confined space in the cellar specialisation? Certificate 3

Therefore out of a total of 15 electives you are now left with a grand total of 5 units when you need 14 elective units! Certificate 3 Recommendations

As noted above in Cert 2 recommendations move elective units; FBPBPG2004 – Operate the bottle sealing process, FBPCEL2014 – Operate the Rotary Vacuum Filtration Process, FBPCEL2xx1 – Operate the Crossflow Filtration Process

This will provide an extra unit in B&P specialisation and an extra 2 units into the Cellar specialisation and they are all of a C3 level anyway

In the B&P specialisation, have the following units available in both C2 & C3; FBPBPG2003 – Operate the carton Packing Process, FBPBPG2011 – Operate the Palletising Process

In many instances these process/machinery have now become highly complex, so would not be out of place if available as an elective in C2 & C3

Skills Impact contacted all industry and RTO stakeholders that provided feedback on the draft components to participate in a survey to identify existing Wine Operations units currently coded to reflect AQF level 2 outcomes for consideration to be redesigned to reflect AQF level 3 outcomes, and for inclusion as electives in the Certificate III.

The survey results were collated and recommendation were put forward for discussion in the stakeholder consultation workshop held with 15 Industry and RTO stakeholders on 12 April. It was agree that 12 units should be redesigned from level 2 to 3 and listed in the Certificate III. A few of these units were also added to the Certificate III.

The following new units reflecting AQF level 3 outcomes also identified as skills gaps by stakeholders. These units will be recommended for development and added as electives in the wine industry qualifications as part of a future project.

- Operate the palletising process (automated)
- Operate the carton packing process (automated)
- Prepare and make additions and finings (advanced)
- Perform fermentation operations (advanced)

All of the recommendations for the Group F General electives have been included in the revised qualifications, except for TLIG2007 Work in a socially diverse environment.

Based on stakeholder advice, TLID2010 Operate a forklift has been replaced with TLILIC2001 Licence to operate a forklift truck in both qualifications.

There needs to be some flexibility in the structure of the Qualification to allow for different staff learning needs and company profiles.	
		It should be noted that in the feedback summary from Skill Impact the number of units required to be completed was raised as an issue for CDC, CEL and B&P. The response given was "Adopted, in part. Redesign of the Certificate III has reduced maximum units to 19. B&P sector has 8 Level 3 units, and only requires a minimum of 6 for specialisation. Further Cross Sector units have been added as Electives. All this should resolve this issue" (points 66-68). As stated, B&P has only 8 Lvl 3 units, not all are achievable at all sites, by all staff. A total of 14 electives are required, with only 2 from other packages. In its current form, with the electives available it is hard to impossible to achieve this as the other units available are not applicable to all staff in the industry.
