Application	<p>This unit of competency describes the skills and knowledge required to work professionally as an equine service provider. It covers knowledge of relevant state/territory health and safety regulations and requirements. Practical skills cover safe handling and securing of equines while working in close proximity, managing hygiene and biosecurity, managing manual handling and environmental hazards, and maintaining accurate records.</p> <p>The unit applies to practitioners who provide a range of equine services working as a contractor. They work autonomously and apply in depth, technical knowledge and skills to provide and communicate solutions for predictable and unpredictable problems within their scope of professional practice.</p> <p>Commonwealth and state/territory health and safety, and animal welfare legislation, regulations and codes of practice relevant to interacting with horses apply to workers in this industry. Requirements vary between industry sectors and jurisdictions.</p>

Performance Evidence	
<p>An individual demonstrating competency must satisfy all the elements and performance criteria in this unit.</p> <p>There must be evidence that the individual has established professional practices in equine service provision, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • researched compliance requirements relevant to own area of equine service, based on analysis of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • current state/territory health and safety legislation and codes of conduct • current state/territory biosecurity legislation • insurance requirements • developed checklists, customised to relevant area of service provision and based on research of compliance requirements above, for the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • hazard assessment and risk control measures related to working on a client's property • safe work practices interacting with horses • practices and equipment for managing hygiene, infection control and biosecurity • equine characteristics and behaviour • safely handled and secured at least ten equines, using low stress handling techniques and restraints, while working in close proximity to undertake an examination or service.

This includes knowledge of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • key features of workplace health and safety legislation and regulations that apply in an equine workplace, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • risk assessment, control and review • responsibilities of contractors • responsibilities of person in effective control (PCUB) • concept of due diligence • safety principles of equine service provision, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • safe work practices • preventative practices to minimise hazards and risks • maintaining handler and equine health and hygiene • purpose and types of personal protective equipment (PPE) • storage of chemicals and veterinary prescribed medicines • safe manual and material handling • emergency response/incident plans, including site plans, processes, roles and responsibilities • personal health and fitness, including managing emotional health related to working with equines • equine behaviour and potential safety hazards, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • increased resistance to bridle, saddle or other gear • nervousness, unsettled or unwilling to perform correctly or consistently • horse bites, kicks, strikes, and crushing • safe equine interactions and handling techniques, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • safety zones for interacting with large animals • safe body positioning working in close proximity • equine behaviour - herd behaviour and unpredictable reactions • safety of others, including bystanders • key biosecurity, hygiene and environmental requirements, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • disinfection and sterilisation procedures • infection control with respect to infectious and zoonotic diseases • zoonotic and infectious diseases, including those caused by bacteria, fungi, parasites and viruses • notifiable diseases and quarantine or isolation procedures • disposal of waste and chemicals • environmental hazards and sustainability practices relevant to equine workplaces.
